

## 2016-7 Pupil Premium Strategy

In 2016-17 the school will receive £192 610 of pupil premium funding.

The main barriers to student progress for qualifying students is less than expected progress in primary school leaving a significant number of students starting here deemed not secondary ready in English and or mathematics. The table below gives details of the KS2 scaled scores achieved by the Year 7 cohort in 2016-17.
